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Bob Cruz,
Army Medic, WWII

Bob Cruz was born in Corona, California, the son of Mexican immigrants. His early life was spent working in the fruit and citrus orchards. When he was in the 4<sup>th</sup> grade his dad died. Bob then had to quit school to support himself. Later on, when he was 17, Bob joined the Army and was trained as a medic. Before he was deployed overseas, his mother gave Bob a picture of a saint which she said would protect him. Bob still carries that picture today.

On D-Day, June 6, 1944, Bob landed in Normandy along with 150,000 troops forming the largest invasion force ever placed into battle in one area.

He was assigned as an ambulance driver, never carrying a gun, transporting dead and wounded off the beaches back to the ships. From there he went inland into the middle of many of the major battles fought in France, Belgium and Germany. He transported wounded American and German soldiers alike from battlefield staging areas to field hospitals, saving hundreds, possibly thousands of lives. Sixteen medics in his unit before him died in ac-

tion. Bob was shot at many times but was fortunately was never hit.

On April 29, 1945 he was with the 42<sup>nd</sup> and 45<sup>th</sup> Army Divisions as they discovered and liberated thousands of political prisoners from Dachau Concentration Camp.

He prepared the freed prisoners by de-lousing, providing clothing, and orientation for preparation of transportation out of the area to safety.

Once the surviving prisoners were liberated and moved out, the surviving captured German soldiers were themselves interred in Dachau prison. For the next three

months Bob's responsibility was to attend to the medical needs of all the people in the camp, Allies and German prisoners alike. He was able to quickly learn the German language. As a result, he was able to communicate very effectively with the German prisoners. In appreciation for his medical attention given them, the German soldiers made and gave Bob a wallet from contraband materials, embossed it with the name Dachau 1945, and his initials. This wallet, his battle soiled ID dog tags, medals and a flag that flew over the US Capital is now kept encased in his home.

He served in Europe for three years during and after the war. Later, he was personally acknowledged for his service in a letter from former US president, Harry S. Truman. When Bob got discharged from the Army and returned home, he was given a personal parade of honor by the Hispanic community of Los Angeles. His military accomplishments were written in a feature article in La Opinion, a large LA Hispanic newspaper. Shortly afterwards, he met and married his sweetheart, Mary Sotello, who has been his wife for 60 years.

After the war, Bob tried to obtain some of his missing medals through the Veteran's Administration. Unfortunately, fire in a government military records warehouse in the early 50s had destroyed his records. He tried for five years, but to no avail. About two years ago,


through an extensive computer search, I was lucky enough to find another source of his records for his medals.

Bob represents a generation that surely saved Britain, France, our country and possibly the world from Nazi dominance. He is one of millions who bravely served both in the military and at home. They all deserve our personal respect and gratitude. Of all those who served, 419,000 never returned home alive or at all. We owe them all our profound gratitude.

It is an honor to know one of the millions of the WWII generation who fought for us, a war hero, a kind and humble man and a dear friend, Bob Cruz, and Mary, his loving wife for 60 years.

He was preceded in death by his brother, Thomas H. Douglas. He is survived by his sister, Connie Owen (Bob), two children, Donna Douglas (Tim) and David Douglas (Dianne) and three grandchildren, Cheyenne, Donovan and Brianne Douglas.

Don married Rea in 1991 and she has two children, Carrie Barron (Reese) and Jeffrey Martin (Trisha).

Don and Rea loved owning an antique shop called, Little House of Treasures, located in the Historic Downtown Murrieta District They resided in Temecula, California at the time of his death.

He will be interred in the Riverside National Cemetery.


