The Vails Build A Cattle Empire With Purchase of Temecula Land

In 1876 Walter L. Vail, a native of Liverpool, Nova Scotia and Herbert Hislop, an Englishman purchased the 160 acre Empire Ranch located southeast of Tucson, Arizona. Over the years Vail, along with various partners, expanded the original land holdings to include over one million acres. In 1881 Margaret Newhall married Walter Vail and moved to Arizona. The next year the Southern Pacific R.R. built a railroad line that provided a means for the Vails to ship their cattle. In 1882 the Empire Land & Cattle Company was formed with Walter Vail as principal shareholder. Then in 1890 Ned Vail and Empire foreman Tom Turner drive over a 1,000 head of cattle overland to Warner's Ranch, California to defeat the Southern Pacific R.R. rate increase for shipping cattle. This would be the beginning of future efforts to purchase land in Temecula Valley and the formation of Vail Ranch. Then in 1901 Vail and his partner C.W. Gates bought the entire Santa Rosa Island off the California coast for cattle grazing.

From the 1800s until the 1960s, cattle remained the backbone of the local economy. The grazing land around Temecula was owned and leased by various ranchers until 1904, Walter Vail began to buy up the local ranches. He pieced together acreage from the four Mexican land grants - Pauba Rancho, Santa Rosa Rancho, Temecula Rancho and Little Temecula Rancho to form the Pauba Ranch.

Eventually, the Vails would own more than 87,500 acres surrounding the little town of Temecula. When Vail was tragically killed in a Los Angeles streetcar accident in 1906, the Empire Land & Cattle Company (later the Vail

Company) took over control of his Temecula Valley ranches. Two of his sons ran the Empire Ranch and associated properties. Walter's youngest son, Mahlon Vail, took over and managed the Temecula operation for many years. The Empire Ranch in Arizona was sold in 1928, and the Temecula area ranches became the primary Vail Ranch lands. Originally it was simply open grazing, but by the 1940s, the Vail Ranch had become a huge feed yard, where cattle were fattened and finished for market. Hoping to grow more and more of their own feed, the Vails decided to dam Temecula Creek and develop an irrigation system for the ranch. The dam was completed in 1948, forming Lake Vail behind it.

Southern California was growing, but Temecula remained much the same. Cattle still roamed the Vail ranch, and as one Elsinore newspaperman joked, the little town had no place to go but up – and it never went up.

But in 1964, the Vails announced the sale of their ranch for \$21 million to a consortium of developers (Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Corporation, Kaiser Industries, and Macco Realty) who announced plans for a 135-square mile "semi urban pastoral" master planned community, Rancho California.

100 Years Ago in Temecula

Selected items from Lake Elsinore Valley Press, Temecula Gossip Column – October 1919

Issue of October 3, 1919

Last Thursday two aviators, who were on their way to Banning from Los Angeles, lost their way and landed at the Pauba Ranch.

Cal Waggoner of Los Angeles, a few days ago succeeded Bob North as foreman of the Pauba Ranch.

Friday and Saturday there was a big fire raging at Dripping Springs. A great deal of wood and pastures belonging to the Pauba Ranch were destroyed, but no other damage was done. A large number of men fought the fire, finally getting it under control and putting it out.

Issue of October 10, 1919

Eli E. Barnett has sold his alfalfa hay and has been hauling and shipping it this week.

The Moons moving picture circuit, which is given at the dancing pavilion once every week, is well patronized by the town people and the surrounding country. Since started here a month ago they have had a full house. They show some of the best films that he can procure.

The scales belonging to the Escallier Bros., and which were out of commission for some time are being repaired so that the trucks which are hauling rock from Pala can have their loads weighed instead of going across the bridge, which is unhandy on account of the weighing of the beets.

Last Sunday the Temecula baseball team went to San Jacinto where they met the San Jacinto team in a very interesting and exciting ball game. From the first inning the score was a tie up to the tenth inning when the home team went to pieces and the visitors got away with the game by the score of 14 to 11 in Temecula's favor. Some game, I'll tell you.

Issue of October 17, 1919

B. B. Higgins has been busy all this week hauling wood to town from his ranch at Happy Valley.

George T. Hall and Henry Gray made a trip to San Diego the first of the week with a load of hogs.

Henry Gray, who has the contract of hauling stone from the Pala mines, had two men repairing the scales belonging to the Escallier brothers. Bob North, who recently resigned as foreman of the Pauba Ranch, is now making his home in town.

Issue of October 24, 1919

Jacques Escallier, who a few weeks ago had a stroke of paralysis and came very near passing away was taken to the Hot Springs at Murrieta. We learn that he is improving very slowly, but hopes he will entirely recover.

Sunday afternoon at the Murrieta Hot Springs a game of baseball was played between San Jacinto and

Temecula. The visitors played such a poor game and made so many errors that it was an easy victory for Temecula.

Last Sunday Joseph had two distinguished visitors who were entertained at dinner served at the Hall lunchrooms. The visitors were George McManus, funny writer for the Sunday Examiner and Herriman, the cartoonist for the Examiner. After dinner they were taken to the hills where they spent the afternoon shooting quail. They are great sports as well as newspapermen.

One night last week John Magee, who lives about two miles south of town, had the misfortune to lose nearly all his chickens. Someone came to the chicken house and took nearly all of them. They are unable to find out who did it. Mr. Magee lost about three dozen.

The opening of the quail and duck hunting season brought into town a large number of hunters from Los Angeles, Riverside and other nearby towns. This part of the country is good for quail hunting and for several days the town was alive with hunters.

Last week the Pauba Ranch Company drove several hundred head of cattle to Beaumont from where they will be shipped to Imperial Valley to their ranch they bought recently.

Issue of October 31, 1919

Mrs. William Friedemann entertained a few of the ladies that are connected with the moving picture company, which is working here one evening at her home. The ladies were very much pleased. They were treated to homemade candy.

Frank Ramos, who is employed at San Bernardino by the Santa Fe, returned home the other day. He was suddenly taken ill.

William Friedemann, proprietor of the meat market, brought a load of hogs of Kuenrich of the Ramona Ranch.

Last week Albert Banks, while on his way from Riverside, had the misfortune of damaging his car. It was so badly damaged that he had to leave it at the garage at Perris and hired another car to come home.
