Remembering

Celebrations of the Past

The 4th of July Celebration in Temecula – 1904

Written by Elizabeth Ludy in 1984

I was 10 years old and my father was helping to get the "Ludy Ranch" ready for the Vails, who had bought it, so my brother – 12 years old – and I spent the summer, from May until December on the ranch in Temecula.

Temecula was going to have a real Western 4th of July Celebration. Families came from far and near, everyone was there. Many of them left home before daybreak in their wagons with children and dogs and all.

The day was sizzling hot as most summer days are in Temecula and dry and dusty but it was the 4th of July and who cared?

Someone had barbecued a whole beef – someone had cooked a large mess of beans to go with it, but the best of all, someone had a very large common washtub filled with cold water and in the tub were bottles and bottles of soda pop – the first time I ever seen or heard of soda pop and anyone who had a nickel could have one of those cold, delicious bottles of soda pop.

The afternoon was spent mostly in horsemanship – trick riding – racing down the dusty street that is now 1st Street in Temecula and how Chris and I would cheer when Little Eddie – our favorite uncle -- on his favorite riding horse, came in first.

Editor's Note: Elizabeth Ludy at 10 years old in 1904 was then 90 years old when she penned this memory of a special July 4th celebration, and the memorable experience of buying her first soda pop for a nickel.

Shelley Leddy will present Trixie Fernald on **August 2**, a Temecula female photographer who was ahead of her time as an entrepreneur.






On **Monday, July 12**, Bill Veale will tell what it was like to be a Vail cowboy and will teach some roping tricks.

President's Message

July, 2021



As local historians we are picky about the accuracy of dates. I had thrown around 20 years in 2020 which had a great ring to it when our original date for our Chamber of Commerce Ribbon Cutting celebrating the merger of the VaRRA (Vail Ranch Restoration Association) and TVHS was set for March 20, 2020. We all know what happened to that.

As we rescheduled the Ribbon Cutting to July 16, 2021, the 20 years number came up again, this time counting from 2001. I knew both dates had some merit but it was time for my public relations self to yield to my historian self and nail down the particulars.

As you might expect from a historical society, there were notes and documents available to be checked. Here's what I found. Temecula's master plan had a Temecula Cultural Arts component. In 1999, the City assigned the Arts Council of Temecula Valley to administer this component including a historical plan for the young city.

Beginning in October 2000, President of the Arts Council, Martha Minkler, formed the Temecula Historic Preservation Committee to meet monthly and make decisions on the historic plan. It was decided a Historical Society would be formed, independent of the City, and directions were made to produce by-laws and form a Board of Directors.

In January 2001, officers were elected, a name chosen, and committees formed. The Society was incorporated by the State of California on Feb 20, 2001.

Whichever way you cut it, the Society has accomplished a lot over the last two decades. Thanks for being a part of this great organization!

100 Years Ago in Temecula

Selected items from Lake Elsinore Valley Press, Temecula Gossip Column – July 1921

Issue of July 1, 1921 By Elizabeth Nienke

Little Clifford Dunlap, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dee Dunlap, of the Pauba ranch, is seriously ill at the Riverside Hospital with an attack of appendicitis. The doctors are waiting until he grows strong enough to stand an operation. The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Dunlap are hoping for the little fellow's speedy recovery.

A carload of registered Aberdeen Angus cattle arrived Monday for the Mendenhall Cattle Co., of Smith Mountain. These animals are some of the very best ever brought into this section.

The Temecula baseball nine was defeated at Perris Sunday, the score being about 16-5. Another game will be played between the two teams, next Sunday at the Hot Springs.

E.J. McSweeney, the potato raiser, has been shipping potatoes this week. Most of this crop will be saved for seed potatoes. Mr. McSweeney has large potato interests near Alhambra, also.

Issue of July 8, 1921 By Elizabeth Nienke

Early Sunday morning word came to the U.S. of-ficers stationed in Temecula that Chinese smugglers were on the road near Warner's Springs. Officers Hackett, Riley, Rodriguez and Burnham left immediately for that region. Sunday night Officers Riley and Rodriguez, who were together surprised the smugglers at Oak Grove, disarmed them and brought them to Temecula Monday morning, later taking them to San Diego to headquarters, with the aid of Officers Hackett and Burnham. There was ten Chinese in the group which the two smugglers were bringing through in two large cars. Excitement reigned supreme in Temecula when the news was spread and many people driving through stopped to take a peep at the group.

Mr. and Mrs. John Ludy and family of Rainbow, and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Walters and daughter spent the Fourth at Oceanside, driving down in the Ludy Ford. While the group was enjoying the celebration at the beach someone who seemed to think himself more in need of a car than the Ludy family, rambled away in it. Friends brought the car-less people home. Early Tuesday morning Mr. Friedemann, while looking for cattle near H. Escallier's place, happened to see a deserted Ford by the road-side and found it to be the Ludy car. Who the guilty party is remains a mystery.

Temecula was practically deserted the Fourth, most everyone going to Oceanside and other places of interest.

Joe Nicolas shipped in four cars of cattle from Modena, Utah, on Saturday.

The Ochls Meat Company, of San Bernardino, shipped out three cars of cattle and one of sheep Monday morning.

Mr. Machado was in Riverside on Wednesday on

business. Mr. Machado has interest in a mine near Winchester. Two cars of feldspar ore were shipped out this week from the mine.

Mrs. Machado had as her guest part of last week Mrs. Belle Dutton of Washington D.C. Mrs. Dutton was a teacher for seven years at the Pechanga Indian School.

S.G. Veazy, of Los Angeles, has taken up his work as assistant cashier in the Temecula bank. Mr. Veazey takes the place of Miss Grace Greenfield, who is to become the bride of Mr. Dan Cantarini in the early fall.

E. J. McSweeney is shipping many potatoes to Alaska. There is a great demand from the northern regions for this particular crop because of its being so free from disease. Mr. McSweeney states that the crop is double what was expected after the heavy frost this spring.

The Temecula baseball nine redeemed themselves Sunday, when they again met the Perris team on the Murrieta Hot Springs grounds and defeated them four to five. The boys looked fine in their much coveted new suits. Next Sunday they play Banning at Banning. A league has been formed between Beaumont, Banning, Hemet, San Jacinto, Elsinore, Perris, Murrieta and Temecula, and very interesting games will follow.

J.B. Kelly is busy extracting honey at his apiary near town.

Mr. Machado was in Riverside on Wednesday on business. Mr. Machado has interest in a mine near Winchester. Two cars of feldspar ore were shipped out this week from the mine.

Mr. E. Sommerville, the Santa Fe engineer has been taking a few days vacation the past week. On Saturday he and his daughter, Mrs. Briggs and two little sons, motored to Oceanside where Mr. Briggs joined them and retuned home with them for over the Fourth.
