The Roads We Travel

It is our mission to identify, preserve and promote the historic legacy of the Temecula Valley and to educate the public about its historical significance.

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Did you know Old Town Temecula is framed by two streets named after Mercedes Pujol? In honor of Women's History Month, let's find out the history behind Mercedes Street and Pujol Street...

It was 1876 when local businessman Domingo Pujol received word that the woman he was supposed to marry was finally old enough to take her vows. Domingo had been in United States territory since the 1850s, knowing that his family had an arranged marriage waiting for him back in Spain.

Imagine young Mercedes, engaged to an older man, a man she didn't know, now waiting for him by the altar.

Domingo Pujol was a lawyer and a businessman who owned part of a Mexican land grant called the Rancho Temecula. Before he left for Spain, he divided the holdings with his partners. The Murrieta brothers, Juan and Ezequiel, claimed the area that now is Murrieta. Domingo held on to 37,000 acres of land that included what would eventually include Old Town Temecula along today's Interstate 15 corridor.

Domingo didn't live in the Temecula Valley. He lived in San Francisco. It might be assumed that he planned to bring his new bride back to California, but that never happened. In 1881, Domingo died in Spain. His Temecula land became the property of his new, young wife.


In 1884, Mercedes Pujol, along with her father and sister, took the long and arduous trip from Spain to California. She made a brief visit to Temecula in order to settle his estate.

Most of the property was sold to the Pauba Land and Water Company, but Mercedes didn't sell her entire holdings. Some land she kept aside and deeded it for use as a school, a cemetery, and a park.

During Women's History Month, take a quick drive down Mercedes Street in front of City Hall. Check out the Pujol school house building which has been moved and is currently at 29825 Santiago Road. At the other end of the street is the Temecula Valley Museum and Sam Hicks Monument Park, also once part of Mercedes Pujol's land. Leaving Mercedes Street, take Main Street through Old Town to Pujol Street where there are several historic homes from the later 1800s. At the end of your tour, pause a moment to think about what it would have been like for young Mercedes Pujol to visit the area for the first time. When she went back to Spain, she remarried and never returned. Today, the roads we travel are dedicated to Mercedes Pujol for her generosity.
