
Mr. and Mrs. Mac Machado of Temecula motored to Elsinore Sunday in their new Buick touring car and gave the Press office a pleasant call.

# Get To Know Your Board Members All About Eve



Many years ago, I was born into a family that had a lot to do with the beginning of Los Angeles. One of my great grandparents, George Gephard, an early settler, raised the money to buy land to start the first normal school in downtown Los Angeles, which eventually became UCLA. One grandfather was the first impresario in the city, managing the Belasco Theatre among other theatrical organizations. He also produced a couple of movies. Another grandfather, a Civil Engineer, graduate of West Point, surveyed and determined for the U S Govt. the best location for the Los Angeles Harbor from San Pedro to Long Beach; and another great grand-father, a Baptist minister, built the first Protestant Church in Southern California with three other ministers in a town called Lexington, which later became El Monte.

My parents were automatically involved in community services, My father was President at one time of the Navy Ball Committee, on the Board of the Southern California Tennis Association, chaired many balls, and taught me to do so. My mother was the 2<sup>nd</sup> President of the Hollywood Bowl Patroness Committee and had me help her with files and invitations from the time I was about 16 years old. She also was President of Las

Madrinas, the main fundraising Debutante Ball for the Children's Hospital and I helped the hospital by selling raffle tickets when I was in High School. They raised my two brothers and me to have well rounded lives. My brothers, Bob and Jim Meyler and I were all given piano lessons. I started at 6 yrs. old. We were encouraged to listen – no talking – to wonderful classical music and attend concerts. Another facet of our lives was exercise. I became proficient enough in swimming to have been asked to swim in the Olympics, but tennis was my main passion in sports and I played with and against many of the top tennis players such as Louise Brough, Gussie Moran, Tom Falkenburg, Bobby Riggs, Billy Talbert and Margaret Osborne. Tennis is a good teacher of fair play and sportsmanship.

As time progressed, I never intended to be a performer. I wanted to compose music and as a result, I was privileged to be taught in high school and college a great deal about composition, and orchestration. I studied the organ and played in two churches for seven years. As for composition, one of my organ compositions was published. I was paid for it, and never tried to publish anything else that I wrote. Because of my family's and my interest in music, I was elected President of the Hollywood Bowl Patroness Committee three different times. I was deeply involved in raising funds for the Music Center in Los Angeles with Mrs. Norman Chandler, and because of our knowledge of people, we were able to raise millions for The Music Center.

So, before I came to Temecula in 1989, my brother Jim Meyler saw to it that I was on the first Board of Arts Council. They asked me to Chair the first Arts Festival. I was pleased to Chair several more, I chaired the Mayor's Ball five times and assisted several times. When it was time to have a historical organization, Martha Minkler pulled together a large group of people interested in History, and wouldn't you know, it became my fortune to be the first President of the Temecula Valley Historical Society.

I've enclosed a chronological resume for you but have not mentioned the lovely awards given to me for which I'm very grateful. The most impressive ones which touch me deeply are having my name on the City's Wall of Honor, the 2002-2003 Lifetime Achievement Award from the Chamber of Commerce and the recent award shared with Martha Minkler of "North County Times' Women of Merit." What makes me do things for Temecula..? It's because I love it, I love people, and I want to do what I'm capable of doing to help make this part of God's world a little better, if possible.
