

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## **In Remembrance of Bill Harker**

William Allen Harker was born September 23, 1916 to Harry Harker and Edith Bahn in Long Beach, California. In 1940 he married Virginia Bosch and they had three children: Rich, Harriet and Jim. They were married 33 years when Virginia passed away. He married Evelyn Moyer in 1973 and became the father of Jean, Georgia, Bob, Don, Sandy, Patty, Jimmy and John. He raised three of Evelyn's children as his own. As a father, he made each of the 11 children feel special and unique.

He was dedicated in his commitment to the community and its growth. He always went above and beyond and often did not take credit, but gave it to others.

Bill had a way of encouraging everyone around him. He listened and inspired us to realize what we could accomplish. He was confident with his ideas and found solutions for us to consider. He was an engineer, cattle driver, city mayor and councilman, yachtsman, aviator, storyteller, musician, poet, cartoonist, photographer, worm farmer, editor, civil servant, event planner, volunteer, skydiver and friend. His sense of humor and the numerous stories he told kept us in laughter. He touched everyone's heart.

Darell and I would add that he gave of his energies and enthusiasm up until his last days. During one of the conversations we had with him in his last week of life, he expressed the sadness that he would not live to see the Vail Ranch restoration.

He was an example to us in how he lived and in how he died. Before coming to Temecula, he was a city council member and served as mayor in Temple City. He served for many years as the treasurer of the Temecula Valley Historical Society and as a director on the Vail Ranch Restoration Association board. He performed his duties in the roles diligently and attended functions of the organizations until the last few months of his life when he became less mobile.

It was always fun to be around Bill. His keen mind was always at work on something, whether to solve a problem for one of the organizations, or to put together a model jenny airplane. He never lost a childish sense of wonder about the world around him and a sense of humor about people and events. Bill embraced non-conventional ideas, including the request that he be able to attend his own funeral so he could hear what people said about him.

As we review Bill's long list of accomplishments and reflect on his enjoyment of life and the people around him, we realize what a privilege it was to know him and to spend time with him.

We will miss Bill and will savor memories of him for the rest of our lives.

## Class of 1953

June 4, 1953 Lake Elsinore Valley Sun

The auditorium was decorated with a variety of colorful cut flowers for the graduation exercises held Monday night at the grammar school. Phillip Barnett opened the program with greetings from the school. The third, fourth and fifth grades sang several numbers and the upper grades sang a medley of popular songs accompanied by Mrs. Annie Knott.

Merle Harback, principal of the school, made the address to the graduating class, using as his theme "Keep in your soul some degree of magnificence." Stanley Hilton, valedictorian of the class, addressed the parents and friends. The class will was read by Albert Mora and Sally Evans gave a tap dance. Among the awards announced by Principal Harback was the **Curtis Publishing Company** certificate to Ralph Friedemann for obtaining the largest number of subscriptions from the school during the year. For the citizenship quizzes form the weekly scholastic paper, Stanley Hilton received the highest award with a rate of 99.3; Johnny Snideman had a rate of 98.2; Susie Salas with 86.9 and George Snideman with 80.9.

#### A Bill Harker Story recalled by Keith Johnson

At the end of the work week, there was a group of us that would meet on Friday evenings in Old Town on a patio behind an old bar. We would drink whiskey or some other hard beverage sharing stories of the past week while overlooking the often dry riverbed.

As the group grew in number, we gave it a name...The Temecula Yacht Club. We enjoyed many Friday evenings together. The club continued to grow and soon we were wearing T-shirts and hats that bore the club's name.

Over time, the name of the club changed to the "Temecula Whale Watching Club". Again, we had club T-shirts and hats made. People use to ask me how we came up with the name. The answer was simple. We would be sitting on the patio overlooking the river with a small ray of daylight left and after four or five drinks; you'd swear you saw a whale swimming down the river."

#### My Last Visit with Bill – by Dick Fox

Bill indicated he had always wondered what the "great beyond" would be like, but that he didn't want to give the other alternative much thought.

I told Bill the story about the man who had requested that he be buried with a fork in his hand, and when asked why, the man said, "when I was a kid at home and Mom cleared the table preparing for dessert – she always told everyone to keep their fork because the best was yet to come." Bill chuckled and repeated "Yes, the best is yet to come."

I told him we all loved him, and he responded with a firm voice and solid hand shake -- "I love you too."

### Words expressed by Maryann Edwards, Mayor Pro Tem

"Perhaps it was that his 96 years had simply allowed him the time necessary to join, advise, found, and help to orchestrate just about every good thing that has taken place in Temecula. But I suspect it was more his business acumen, management skills, generosity, sense of adventure, love of people, and his very big heart that made Bill Harker a local legend and friend to almost everyone he met. I'm very glad he was mine, and I will miss him terribly."
